GLENS FALLS HOSPITAL Emergency Department -Registered Nurse/ Forensic Examiner

Colleagues said Lauren Burch is not only an amazing nurse but "one of the best human beings I know." The mom of two little boys is a full-time student studying to be a family nurse practitioner. Burch has worked in the Emergency Department for eight years and "was an amazing nurse from day one."

Burch consistently demonstrates exceptional compassion, clinical expertise and goes above and beyond her duties to provide outstanding care, always going the extra mile to address all of the needs of her patients and their families, colleagues said. Burch works the overnight shift which often times means working with a skeleton crew without an IV team. This is one of Burch's strengths. Fellow nurses said she is always happy to help staff throughout the hospital and has been unsuccessful in placement of the IV she was called upon to place.

Patients are often anxious or are experiencing pain because IV access has already been attempted prior to her arrival. She takes her time to help calm the patient when needed and addresses any concerns or questions they have before she even makes the attempt always explaining what she is doing to help decrease their anxiety and it does not go unnoticed by her coworkers or the patients who appreciate her great care.

On top of her responsibilities as an ED nurse she is also a forensic examiner. She does forensic exams across the lifespan and also provides exams and services to domestic violence survivors. This is an area that requires specialty training, continued education and on-call time above and beyond her hours in the ED. "Lauren is a nurse we are very fortunate to have in our ED and our patients are thankful to receive care from," her colleagues said.

years, colleagues said she has cared for thousands of babies and their families. Cleveland has supported families through the best and worst of times and gives 150% of herself to her patients 100% of the time, they said.

Cleveland is an expert in her field. She is a resource for all, sharing her knowledge and clinical skills and is often called to do labs or start an IV because of her expert level skills. Staff knows that she is there to help in any way. From answering questions, or helping care for a baby, "Sam is always willing to lend a hand and share her knowledge and expertise with younger nurses," colleagues said.

She is a strong charge nurse, leading the team through hectic times. She has won a safety award, and she has been a Daisy nominee (multiple times).

What makes Cleveland an amazing NICU nurse is her compassion for her patients. "Samantha Cleveland is the nurse that we should all strive to be," colleagues said.



BRITTANY DWYER

ALBANY MEDICAL CENTER Registered Nurse - D2-N Intensive Care

Patient Cyndy Wilber spent several weeks in the hospital in 2024 after back surgery, a three-way heart bypass further complicated by a collapsed lung, suffering from severe pain.

"There were days when the pain was so intense that all

I wanted to do was close my eyes & shut out the rest of the world. As busy as D2 was, Brittany always showed up with a smile, encouragement, and help," Wilber said.

Dwyer gently encouraged Wilber to move and was her biggest cheerleader with every bit of progress she made. With such intense pain, Wilber said she often broke down in tears while trying to walk. Dwyer would stay by her side, guiding her back to her bed, and was ready by her side with pain relief.

"She never once gave up on my making progress each day. She was never cross or hurried with my care, though I knew I was not her only patient. It was because of the care from nurses, like Brittany, that I was able to recover," Wilber said.

JAMIE EDDY

GLENS FALLS HOSPITAL Obstetrics

Colleagues call Jamie Eddy the "nurse that can do it all." "You have a question? Call Jamie. Need an IV? Call Jamie. Need a suggestion for a position to help rotate a baby in utero? Call Jamie. Need advice? Call Jamie. Need a good laugh? Call Jamie. Need a good cry? Call Jamie," they said.

Eddy is a source of knowledge that she generously is willing to share, coworkers said. "On top of the amazing nurse she is, she also is the Snuggery's bereavement coordinator. She will come in day, night, or on a day off to help mom's and their family navigate through the difficulties of losing their infant," her coworker said.

Eddy goes above and beyond for patients and family members who are experiencing a pregnancy loss, through a miscarriage or stillbirth. She has a bereavement certification that she voluntarily obtained to expand her knowledge and professional growth.

"During one of the most difficult times of someone's life, Jamie is a shoulder to cry on. She is extremely supportive, compassionate, informative, and truly present in the moment for staff caring for the patient and the patient and their family members," her coworkers said.

Colleagues said Eddy deserves this recognition for her continuous, compassionate care.



CORTNEY JACKSON

ELLIS MEDICINE ICU Nurse Manager E1 and E2, former COVID Nurse Manager

Not a year into Cortney Jackson's new unit, COVID-19 struck. Jackson went from being a brandnew first-time Nurse Manager of a new skillset, to being thrust into the middle of a pandemic stricken, locked down unit, all while being pregnant.

"She never once wavered, even when she found out she was miscarrying our first baby. She never once wanted to throw in the towel. She took it head on, never questioning what she was doing," Jackson's wife, Elizabeth, said. Jackson always made sure her staff was fully equipped with the necessary PPE and made sure they always did what they needed on the unit to keep them all safe and protected from this virus. She never once questioned jumping into assignments when needed or necessary, or doing whatever was asked of her, Elizabeth said.

She was a constant support system to so many of her nurses and techs. When the staff was dwindling, she stayed strong and fought for more help. She fought for the little staff she had because she believed in them. "I have seen firsthand the empathy she had for her team as well as the lives of many patients and families she has touched.

"She did all of this while losing one baby and being pregnant with baby number two! She may not be at bedside 24/7 but she sure did, fearlessly, lead her team with pride," Jackson's wife said.

COLUMBIA MEMORIAL HEALTH Staff Nurse, Emergency Department Nominated by Stephanie Hisgen

Justine LaValley has dedicated her career to taking care of patients in a community that she calls her home and has raised her children in, her administrator said. Most of her career has been spent taking care of the most critical patients in Columbia Memorial's Emergency Department. LaValley's dedication and spirit has never wavered.

LaValley has been recognized numerous times internally both as a Daisy Award recipient, as well as a recipient of numerous facility awards for her attention to detail, compassion for caring, and ability to identify errors to prevent patient harm. These accolades alone make her stand out as an exceptional nurse.

The family of one special patient, five-year-old Natalia, sings Kirstin Lawless's praises as they journey through two years of chemotherapy sessions.

"Kirstin is our daughter, Natalia's nurse during her chemotherapy treatments at the Melodies Center at

Albany Med. She's been a part of our journey since March of 2023. Natalia needed to have 42 chemo treatments over the course of 13 months. She has currently completed 36," said Natalia's mom, Diana.

Kirstin has gone above and beyond to become "fast friends" with Natalia, including learning the names of her My Little Ponies, and celebrating her love of unicorns. Natalia sings a song to distract her from her port being de-accessed and Kirstin sings it with her. Natalia is also nervous with Band-Aid removal, so Kirstin makes sure to give her unicorn Band-Aids for sensitive skin and uses "magic spray" to help ease the removal.

"Her disposition is always energetic and happy. We will miss her so much after we finish treatment this spring. She is a great asset to the team of nurses up there. Anyone who has a child visiting that department knows all the anxiety and stress that comes with it. Kirstin makes it a warm and pleasant experience," Diana said.

"We love chatting with her while she's in the room and Natalia runs off the elevator to go find her as soon as we arrive. In our book she deserves to be nurse of the year because this last year has been a little easier with her on our team," she said.

Natalia's aunts and uncles also praised Kirstin's work with Natalia, calling her "an angel sent from heaven" and said she is "changing lives, one smile at a time."

A teaching colleague noted he was extremely devoted to his nursing students, and said Mark always had an open door and helped them no matter what time it was.

Others said Mark treated everyone around him with respect and kindness. He made everyone around him comfortable and happy. He always had a smile on his face and his positive attitude was contagious. He helped so many students throughout the years become amazing nurses by listening, supporting and guiding them.

"He touched so many lives. He will be missed greatly," another said.

One student said that as a professor, Wahl didn't just teach the science of nursing—he "taught the soul of it." He made every student feel seen, capable, and valued, fostering confidence in those just beginning their journey into healthcare. His pride in his students didn't end at graduation; he continued to champion and celebrate their successes throughout their careers.

"Even as he faced his own battle with cancer, Mark remained a pillar of strength for those around him. He never stopped encouraging, teaching, and spreading light. The ripple effect of his kindness and wisdom is immeasurable, living on in every nurse he mentored and every patient those nurses go on to serve," another said.

The establishment of the Maria College Mark Wahl Scholarship in his honor is a testament to his lasting impact on the nursing profession. This scholarship will continue to inspire and support future nurses, ensuring Mark's legacy lives on.

Patients said that Madison "Maddy" Zuk is "what nurses should be all about."

"Maddy was so understanding and knowledgeable and made us feel calmer," one patient said.

Another said that Zuk goes out of her way to have a positive, upbeat, caring, yet honest and factual review of

the patient situation. She talks to the family members and tells it like it is, but in a kind way. She doesn't sugarcoat things, yet she does try to have a positive tone of voice and a great attitude.

Another patient said that Zuk was her husband's one-to-one nurse in the ICU over the Thanksgiving holiday "when she could have chosen to be at home with her family."

"She was there when our world was turned upside down. He was intubated for 11 days, and it took him six days to wake up once he was removed from sedation. Even after he was moved to another floor, Maddy came to visit us," the patient said. Days later, Zuk brought the couple cookies and wrote a beautiful card, including the names of all family members!

"I have had several surgeries myself over the years in various hospitals, and I can say she has a heart of gold," the patient said.

Mark "Pop" Wahl – Nurse, Teacher, Veteran, Friend

he passing of Mark "Pop" Wahl leaves a profound emptiness in the hearts of those fortunate enough to know him. A devoted husband, father, grandfather, teacher, veteran, and friend, Mark lived a life defined by compassion, commitment, and service to others.

Mark proudly served in the United States Navy from 1974 to 1994, participating in Operation Frequent Wind—the final evacuation of the Vietnam War. After retiring from active duty, he moved to Delmar, where he became a fixture in the local community. His continued service included over 40 years as a member of the American Legion and VFW. He served two terms as Commander of American Legion Post 1040, during which he reinstituted the Sons of the American Legion Squadron. He was a past president of the Capital Area Chief Petty Officers Association, a member of the Bethlehem Memorial VFW Post 3185, and the Bethlehem Masonic Lodge 85. Mark also played a vital role on the Veteran's Memorial Park Committee from its inception in 2001 through its dedication on Memorial Day 2006.

Beyond his military service, Mark found a second calling in nursing. As a distinguished male nurse and esteemed faculty member at both Maria College and Capital Region BOCES, he became a mentor and inspiration to countless students. Mark had a natural ability to connect with everyone he met, whether as a teacher, colleague, or caregiver. His students didn't just learn from him—they respected and adored him.

Antoinette Fischer is the Nursing Recruitment Specialist at Columbia Memorial Health where she focuses on recruitment of RNs, LPNs, and ancillary staff. In 2024, she helped to recruit more RNs into the organization than in the past three years. It is her quick connection with applicants and the knowledge of the organization that make her superb in her role, colleagues said.

Antoinette is also an adjunct faculty member at Columbia Greene Community College Nursing Department. In December 2024, she led the nursing leadership team's quarterly service project by Adopting-A-Senior from Home Sweet Home Assisted Living.

Since 2020, she has partnered with the local school to create a community food drive. Each class contributes specific items that are then assembled into meal kits, ensuring families have everything they need for a warm meal without the burden of rising food costs.

This remains completely free and open to anyone in her community.

Stephanie Hisgen has served as the Chief Nursing Officer at Columbia Memorial Hospital since 2022. She in partnership with nurse leaders and direct care RNs developed the CMH Nursing Strategic Plan which was reviewed and revised in 2025.

Another pointed out how Ashley was calm and level headed at their loved one's bedside during the final days of their life.

"She was with me in the hospital while my significant other's life was ending. She treated the staff with compassion and respect," the patient's family said. "She asked the important questions that needed to be asked and she helped make decisions from her knowledge and experience."

Another patient's family member said when they were being treated for a long illness with serious complications, Kenneth took the time to get to know them and how to best handle their issues.

They added that one roommate's family was unable to visit her, and she kept asking if she was dead. Kenneth would come in and calmly explain no, she was at Albany Medical Center, hold her hand and reassure her.

"For such a young man to already have the technical skills and the compassion was truly remarkable to witness," they said.
